# General Information for Pre-Major Advisors 2024-2025

1. The <u>College website</u> has links to important <u>calendars</u>, <u>forms</u>, <u>advising information</u>, and <u>curriculum information</u>, among much else.

#### 2. **Fall 2024** key dates:

- a. Classes begin on Tuesday, August 27
- b. Last day to swap 1st quarter Engagement: Monday, September 2
- c. Last day to add a class, select the AU (Audit) option, or change to or from "Credit/No Credit": **Tuesday, September 10**
- d. Last day to drop a class: Wednesday, September 11
- e. Advising Season: Monday, October 14 through Thursday, November 7
  - i. Traffic might also be heavy from **August 21** through **September 11** as well as **December 2** through **December 13**
- f. Last day to withdraw from a course for a "W" on the transcript: **Tuesday**, **October 22**
- g. Last day to swap 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter Engagement: Wednesday, October 23
- h. Enrollment begins for Spring 2025: Monday, November 4
- i. Final Exams take place from Monday, December 9 to Tuesday, December 17

### 3. **Spring 2025** key dates:

- a. Classes begin on Monday, January 13
- b. <u>McIntire</u> Application Deadline: **April 30, 2025** (application opens January 2025; decisions released June 2025; decision deadline TBD; first-year students only)
  - Second-year students during AY 2024-2025 will be able to apply for admission to McIntire, though will have a <u>different admissions process</u> than first-year students. Their application deadline is **January 2025** (application opens November 2024; decisions released February 2025)
- c. <u>Data Science</u> Application Deadline: **TBD** (first-year students only)
- d. <u>Batten</u> Application Deadline: **January 24, 2025** (application opens November 1, 2024; decisions released February 21, 2025; decision deadline February 28, 2025; second-year students only)
- 4. Scheduling appointment times with students on Advising system
  - a. Use <u>Bookings</u>, a Microsoft 365 app, which will allow you to create a calendar of availability, with a link that you can then send to your students to sign-up for a time. **Do not release advising holds without first meeting with students**.

b. In the event students fail to come during their scheduled meeting times, it is suggested that you schedule one or two subsequent group meetings rather than schedule individual meetings.

### 5. Talking with advisees:

- a. In-person
  - i. It is expected that most of your advising will be done in person. When there are circumstances under which you might need to talk to a student on the phone or Zoom...
- b. Phone
  - i. You can dial \*67 from your personal phone and then the student's number if you would like to block your number or install UVA Softphone, which allows you to make UVA phone calls from mobile devices.
- c. Zoom
  - i. Make sure to enable the waiting room, which allows you to admit students one at a time to a long meeting block, rather than having to set up individual meetings with each student.

- 6. Curriculum and General Education Tracking:
  - a. Faculty use SIS (Student Information System) to access an Academic Requirements report (AR Report) or transcripts for their advisees. You may find it helpful to ask each advisee to bring an AR report or laptop with them when they meet with you. You may make this request when you contact your advisees to inform them of your office hours.
- 7. Fulfilling the General Education Requirements:
  - a. <u>Engagements</u>: Students enroll in four Engagements courses in their first year (two seven-week courses per semester); 8 credits
  - b. Literacies:
    - i. First Writing Course (3 credits)
    - ii. Second Writing Course (3 credits)
      - 1. This course might also count as a Discipline. Check the course's attributions in SIS
    - iii. World Language (variable credits)
      - 1. Earn exemption by placing beyond the 2020 level by examination
      - 2. Take 14 credits, or four semesters, of a language in the proper sequence, typically finishing at the 2020 level
      - 3. Take a <u>placement exam</u>, completing the remaining courses in the sequence up to the fourth semester, usually 2020

- iv. Quantification, Computation, and Data Analysis (6-8 credits)
- c. <u>Disciplines</u>:
  - i. Artistic, Interpretative & Philosophical Inquiry
  - ii. Chemical, Mathematical & Physical Universe
  - iii. Cultures & Societies of the World
  - iv. Historical Perspectives

- 10. Legal Liability of Advisors i.e. Can an advisor or anyone else involved in the advising of students be held liable for "faulty advice"?
  - a. The Office of University Counsel provides the following: "Generally, a faculty or other advisor who is sued for their work would be offered representation and would be insured for potential liability, for acts undertaken in the scope of their employment. 'Faulty advice' likely is not going to be a compelling legal theory for a finding of liability, but of course anyone can file a lawsuit, even if it is frivolous or silly."
